

Math Activity week 9: Subitizing

Learning Target: I can tell the number in a set without counting (subitizing).

Learning Target: I can add together numbers in 2 sets.

Subitizing is an early math skill where children are able to know a number of objects in a set without having to count them out. When children are able to "subitize" they are better able to recognize patterns.

**An activity that is free and you can do anywhere is subitizing by holding up your fingers.

- 1. Parent holds up their fingers on one hand. Depending on if your child is "not there yet" or "needs a challenge" will dictate how high you go up in numbers.
- 2. Ask your child how many fingers they see. Explain that you do not want them to count how many you have. They tell you just by looking.
- 3. If your child has mastered some numbers but not others than focus on the ones they need more practice with.
- 4. Tag team! You can go back and forth between you and your child guessing.



**Another way to practice this skill is to use dominoes or dice.

Using dominoes:

- 1. Use number cards or write out the numbers 1 to 5 on index cards or cut up pieces of paper.
- 2. Let your child match the number card to the domino with the corresponding number of dots.

Need a challenge: Do this activity with numbers 6 to 12.

Using dice:

- 1. Let your child roll a dice.
- 2. The side that is "face up" is the side they tell you the number of.

Need a challenge? Use 2 dice.

*These activities can also be done by using small blocks or Legos, small counting bears (toys) & counting links. Use what you have available at home.







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
